I was one of the lucky members to have my name drawn out of a hat from the list of volunteers to be a mounted steward at Badminton for the cross country section of the Mitsubishi Motors Cup (formally grassroots championships), something I have never done before. Partly because I have only recently rejoined the club and partly because I didn't have a suitable mount until now.

What next? The official envelope came from the horse trials office. I had to provide my own packed lunch but wait, there were badges and tickets in there too. I read the instructions. Plaited, no problem she's hogged. Hacking jacket, eek, I didn't have one - I do now!

The morning arrived. 6.30 alarm, not too early I know but it is for me! Len (hubby) and I got the horses in and fed them giving Cocoa, my pony for the day, extra breakfast. The first horse started at 9.30 and for the next almost 3 hrs we trundled backwards and forwards collecting all the judges slips and passing them to the next pair at the lake.

We managed about 20 mins for lunch where we were able to pass our mounts to some kind grooms (KLRC volunteers!!) waiting for us at Nickie's car.

The afternoon continued with the next class which finished around 4.30pm. I must admit that after 6 hrs in the saddle at about 3pm I am just beginning to feel it. Cocoa, bless her, kept going regardless. She was pretty well behaved throughout the day - Sue might disagree - only becoming a bit hungry and tired towards the end. We had a few minor mishaps - Cocoa got my foot caught in the string on the edge of path and dragged it with us for a few metres. A kind spectator put it back in place for us. After 8hrs in the saddle my backside was buzzing a little. Other than my legs a bit tired the following day Cocoa and I were fine.

For those of you that know me you will know that a couple of weeks ago I landed my dream job.

After 10 1/2 years of Policing the mean streets of South Glos I have broken free and have started training as a Mounted officer.

At first I thought my training would be easy...how wrong I was!

Good and bad parts so far.

I ride for around 4 hours each day which sounds great however I have to mount the horses from the ground. The smallest horse is 17hh. The training involves more lateral work than I knew existed. This helps to present the horses to crowds side on and then have the ability to move more people along. The turns on the haunches are used to get out of tight spaces...I could go on as all the school moves serve a purpose however I am trying to keep this short.

I have jumped lots (I will literally be jumping through hoops soon!)





I have been shocked by the horses behaviour. Last week I patrolled over the suspension bridge where road works were being carried out. My horse seriously looked at a noisy flappy, clunky generator and yawned (whilst we were photographed more than Justin Bieber.)

At the moment my training is based at Bower Ashton but we will be moving to the Hand equestrian soon.

Next week I start riot train so will be hitting things whilst chasing my colleagues!
